## And Justice For All

The Ministry to Seafarers is a ministry of Word and deed. We share the Gospel and give out literature. But we also practice the Word by serving seafarers in all kinds of ways. One of the ways we do this is by advocating for them when they are in need.

Last Spring Gary was warned in advance of problems on a ship soon to arrive in port. I (Gary) contacted our local ITF (International Transport workers Federation) to alert them of the issue. When the vessel arrived I boarded the ship to find the ITF worker already on board conducting interviews. I met several of the crew as well, and they began sharing their stories of discrimination and bullying on board by some of the officers, especially the captain.

The ITF worker remained on board that ship from 11 AM until 5 AM the following morning! He said it was the most difficult case he has ever handled, and thanked me for alerting him to the problem. It wasn't fully resolved to his satisfaction, but the situation did improve, and the shipping company was made aware of the issue.

Thankfully cases like this one are rare, especially since the passing of the Maritime Labour Convention of 2006 – of which Canada is a signatory. But in our role as chaplains we are often seen as the first responders for those who are in need. As one seafarer stated recently – "Seafarers chaplains are the visitors we really appreciate and look forward to meeting. Everyone else has an agenda and demands our time and energy. You guys come to serve and give."
